

School Community Vehicle

We are delighted to announce our school will be able to benefit from a 'school community vehicle' which has been donated by local heating, air conditioning and electrical specialists Fantail Services Ltd for schools in the North Porirua and Porirua East Kāhui Ako Communities of Learning to access. The van, generously donated by founders Chris Spayes and Trent Watson, will enable our students to be transported around the north Porirua area to inter school events such as chess tournaments, sporting events and technology challenges. The 'School Community Van' seats 1 driver and up to 8 students. It has been configured so students can face each other in the vehicle if desired. Fantail Services Limited invested approximately \$45,000 in the vehicle and will pay for the cost of annual servicing as well as a \$2,000 per annum GPS system for added health and safety.

Picking up or dropping off kids at school?

Choose safe parking every time

Everyone's "only here for a minute or two" but where and how you park matters – our tamariki can't be seen if we park illegally

Safer school runs

If you're stopping and parking near a school, choose safe parking every time

When children arrive at or leave school each day, how you park and drive can protect them or put them in danger.

Drivers and children need good visibility around schools to be able to see each other. Parking restrictions are in place near schools for a reason – to protect our tamariki.

If you choose to stop or park illegally you could get fined.

WellKiwis Household:

We are looking for whanau living in the Wellington region (Excluding Kapiti/Wairarapa), who have someone 19 years of age or under living in their home and plan to continue living in the Wellington region over the next two years to join an influenza study. The study is planned to run for seven years (although families can drop out at any time without any questions asked)

The purpose of the study is to investigate influenza transmission within the household setting and find out what factors make occupants more at risk or conversely what prevents some individuals from developing the flu. There are many benefits of being part of an International study:

- During the Flu season whanau will have access to our clinical team (including Registered nurses, a midwife and phlebotomists),

- when unwell we are able to visit and complete a swab and inform the family of the virus causing their illness (including ways of keeping well/managing the virus)

- For every sample taken a \$30 e-gift card is given, these can be saved up and spent whenever the family decide to do so

- Families are contributing to the scientific knowledge about the flu and covid viruses

WellKiwis Infant study:

We are also looking for pregnant women living in the Wellington region who may be interested in joining the study. This study is interested in looking at how an infant's immunity is developed from their first experience of the flu and how this imprints on their immune system. The benefits are the same as above, and the study is also an observational longitudinal study running for seven years. I attach copies of the brochure for both the Household and Infant study.
