Political Rant - Overcrowded Schools in our Kahui Ako

Tomorrows Schools (1989) removed enrolment schemes from schools. No longer were parents required to send their children to their local schools, it was all about free choice. A little later the decile system was introduced to deliver a greater degree of funding to schools in lower socio-economic areas. The decile system thus defined some schools and communities as needy.

The combined effect of these two flawed policies was to create a "good school, poor school" perception in the minds of many parents, with decile rankings used as a very poor proxy to judge quality. The disaster this created saw the reintroduction of zones and ballots in the year 2000. The damage had already been done though, as enrolments in decile I - 2 schools declined and enrolments in higher decile schools climbed with some schools at 50% plus of their roll, out of zone pupils (not the fault of Boards or Principals I must add)

The Ministry still uses a formula that requires a school to carry only about 10% (it may be less) of out of zone students - irrespective of how many pupils attend the school - before it will commit to funding for new classrooms, or school infrastructure that reflects the number of students and staff in a school. The director of education (Wellington), at a recent meeting with principals, implied that schools in our Kahui Ako could not expect new buildings while there are many schools with empty classrooms in Porirua East. It is an outrageous notion that because there are empty classes in one area, schools in another area should lose their staffroom, principal's office and hall because of a lack of classroom space.

Our children, teachers and parents; our school communities, are not responsible for the flawed and divisive policies of the past, yet we are hostage to Ministry funding formulas that sustain unreasonable overcrowding in our schools. I would like any community members who feel a sense of outrage, to write to our local M.P., the Mayor, Minister of Education, P.M. whoever. Voice our concern.

The Animal School: A Fable by George Reavis.

I'll leave you with a little philosophical introspection. This is an old but worthy fable, written when George Reavis was the Assistant Superintendent of the Cincinnati Public Schools back in the 1940s!

Once upon a time the animals decided they must do something heroic to meet the problems of a "new world" so they organized a school. They had adopted an activity curriculum consisting of running, climbing, swimming and flying. To make it easier to administer the curriculum, all the animals took all the subjects.

The duck was excellent in swimming. In fact, better than his instructor. but he made only passing grades in flying and was very poor in running. Since he was slow in running, he had to stay after school and also drop swimming in order to practice running. This was kept up until his webbed feet were badly worn and he was only average in swimming. But average was acceptable so nobody worried about that, except the duck.

The rabbit started at the top of the class in running but had a nervous breakdown because of so much makeup work in swimming. The squirrel was excellent in climbing until he developed frustration in the flying class where his teacher made him start from the ground up instead of the treetop down. He also developed cramps from overexertion and then got a C in climbing and D in running.

The eagle was a problem child and was disciplined severely. In the climbing class, he beat all the others to the top of the tree but insisted on using his own way to get there.

At the end of the year, an abnormal eel that could swim exceeding well and also run, climb and fly a little had the highest average and was valedictorian.
