Well, while we certainly have not been in crisis mode covering Covid absences, we did have a challenging time with staff absences last week, so it was more of an irritant than anything else. Our teachers are doing an equally magnificent job in taking extra students when classes have had to be split.

The office has been short staffed over the last couple of weeks but Jean, Nikki and Sharon have covered for each other and have still managed to work with their normal high-end efficiency.

Our Teacher Aides have been hit hard. They do a lot of one on one and small group work with children. As it is younger children who are vulnerable to infection, junior teachers and Teacher Aides tend to be in the Covid firing line. We really notice it when our T.A.'s are away. What a wonderful job they do. Not only in taking the load off classroom teachers but the positive impact they have on the students they work with. The empathy they show, the support of classroom learning and the impact on the social development of our tamariki is a joy to watch. I think that we are very lucky to have the group of Teacher Aides that we do.

As is normal for him, our Mikaele, will put anything to one side to provide assistance to any of our staff or students even if it means extra work for him.

Reading

There has been a fair bit of blame directed at the education system for the decline in reading standards over the last ten years. Without becoming too defensive, we as a profession, have to wear a lot of the blame, after all the data doesn't lie; or does it!!!

And while controversy continues to rage over whether early instruction should focus on learning to sound out words (systematic phonics) or using the meaning of unknown words to work them out (whole language), progress in literacy is compromised. Sadly, books have been replaced by devices - I regard my Kindle as a book and not a device - apps, gaming, Netflix and chat rooms predominate, text language has diluted real language, and acronyms and emoji's have further reduced the need to write much.

When national sporting Icons - who shall remain nameless - are heard on T.V. promoting their new app saying how great it is because and I quote, "I don't read and kids these days don't read" then we have a problem in the messaging from some of our role models.

For years it became unfashionable to teach grammatical skills and spelling in isolation as contextual and integrated approaches were favoured. Many specific skills slipped through the gaps. I'm happy to say that at Adventure School specific, targeted teaching has always been valued.

Anyway, without becoming too political I'd just like to say the more reading that can happen at home, whether it be recreational, listening to the kids read or reading to the kids, the better off they will be.

Staff Changes

Sadly, we are saying goodbye to two highly valued staff members.

Rachel Grant will leave us at the end of the term to take up a position at Karori West School and Daniel Wright has won a position at Raumati South School, starting next term in week three. In both cases, economics and family have been the deciding factors. The opportunity, to work in schools much closer to home - rather than a desire to leave Adventure - has been the major motivator.

Both will decimate travelling time; Rachel will put that saved time into her new school and personal business opportunities and Daniel as a "new" father, will be five minutes away from school so therefore much closer to home and family.

These are new and exciting opportunities for both and they go with our very best wishes.

We are lucky to have quality teachers to fill the vacant positions in Nīkau and Rimu until the end of this year.
